Could this be your favorite philatelic item? The tabs on these stamps of Israel are certainly an interesting aspect of collecting the stamps of Israel. The tabs are selvedge and are part of the sheets the stamps are printed on. Information regarding the event being commemorated is printed on the tab, and it is considered part of the stamp. Album pages for Israel are available with or without tabs. The Scott catalogue has a note in the beginning of the Israel section regarding the value of Israeli stamps. Scott will not value certain issues unless the tabs are attached to the stamps. Specialized catalogues such as Bale regard the tab as part of the stamp issue and characterize those issues missing the tab as incomplete. Some of the tabs not only contain text but also artwork. Israeli stamps are certainly beautiful, which is what makes our hobby more interesting and appealing.

#### **JANUARY PRESENTATION**

Bob Meegan gave an interesting presentation on exhibiting on January 18<sup>th</sup>. The International body of stamp collecting is the International Federation of Philately (FIP). They set the guidelines for exhibiting that national organizations, such as the APS, follow. The FIP defines 11 classes of philately for exhibits:

**Traditional philately** - study the parts of the postage stamp, analyzing watermarks, how stamps are printed and other technical aspects.

**Topical philately** - stamps of favorite subjects or themes, such as flowers, animals, cars, and many others.

**Postal history** - how stamps were used on mail, postal history documents.

**Postal stationery** - envelopes, post cards, with an embossed or pre-printed stamp.

**Stamp forgery** - stamp forgeries and philatelic counterfeits.

**Revenue /Cinderellas** - labels, telegraph and fiscal stamps, etc. Cinderellas are not valid postage.

**Aerophilately** - airmail stamps, labels, documents, post cards, and letters moved by flying couriers.

**Astrophilately** - the chronicle of man's space conquests with postal stationery and cards. Also space flown mail and covers.

**Postcards/ Maximaphily** - postcards with stamps and cancels that match the design are called maximum cards.

**Philatelic Literature** -the study of stamps and books, magazines, and other forms of philatelic literature are officially recognized as a legitimate branch in philately.

**Youth Philately** - youth involvement in cartoon and comic characters that can encourage kids to begin stamp collecting.

### JANUARY PRESENTATION (Con't)

Exhibits competing at APS and international shows are classified according to one of the 11 classes.

A new class has been introduced covering Modern Philately. It seems that the FIP and the APS are beginning to be less strict as to the quality of material being judged in exhibits. In the past, the scarcity of an item carried the strongest weight in evaluating exhibits. Common items were not judged equally, but now the item is judged in context with the entire exhibit. Thus, it is possible to win a gold medal with an exhibit consisting of inexpensive material. It is even possible to construct an exhibit from material purchased from a Buffalo Stamp Club Auction!

information on international shows throughout
the world. Perhaps plan your vacation around an
international stamp show!

### **EXPLORING STAMPS**

In case you missed it, *The American Philatelist* had a column called *Digital Discoveries* by Mara Hartzell. In the column, Mara interviewed Graham Beck, the producer of *Exploring Stamps* which supports our hobby with a variety of well-produced YouTube videos. He has been doing this since 2016, so he is beginning Season 3.

If you haven't viewed some of his videos yet, I encourage you to do so. They are very interesting with an "infectious enthusiasm for philately". He has typically picked a stamp randomly out of a box and learned about it by researching and delving into the topic including some filming of the topic or at location. You can subscribe to the *Exploring Stamps* YouTube channel at <a href="https://aps.buzz/Explore">https://aps.buzz/Explore</a> - it's free and notifies you when new episodes and other channel videos are launched. Could be very good for youngsters or new collectors — check it out.
