EUROPEAN POSTAL BEGINNINGS

The Hanseatic League, which started in northern Germany, was a guild of merchants organized to protect themselves against pirates and thieves. In time, they started a regular service of mail and message exchange with post riders that operated between the principal towns of the league only. This lasted between the 12th and 15th century and became the model for the rest of Europe. The league was well organized throughout northern Europe. They had their own horses used exclusively for letter service. At each stop, the time of the receipt and the passing of the dispatches were written on the face of each letter. Post stations were also important economic centers. They became the central spot in the development of villages and cities throughout Europe.

As in ancient times, the use of horses for the delivery of mail was a much easier and faster method, compared to foot or cart travel. Although used much earlier in Asia, the Europeans used a system they designated as post roads and the men became known as post riders. These were usually a network of regularly scheduled services run by the State or State licensed monopoly.

EUROPEAN POSTAL BEGINNINGS (CON'T)

This system was complete with distance markers and waypoints. Unlike earlier methods, these post riders collected and delivered mail over the course of their route. They would meet other post riders along the way and easily exchange correspondence. This would allow them to cover a considerable distance and reduce cost. Although there was limited interaction with other mail services in towns, this post network was a separate entity under separate management. The main difference was ancient systems were exclusively for government or military use. Mail service on the continent changed very little from the Middle Ages through the 18th century.

BOEING 747 50th Anniversary

On January 21, 1970 the first commecial flight of the newly christened Boeing 747 took place between New York and London. It was a magnificant event with famous personalities on the flight and the event being covered by the world's media. Also on board were 65,000 first jet flight covers to commemorate the event. It is J-1652 in the Airmail Catalogue. With the success of the first flight, the 747 entered regular service flying routes all over the world. It is slowly being retired from passenger service and is being relegated to cargo service.



Each time a new flight route was introduced first flight covers were created and flown. Because of the large number of first flight covers serviced, they are readily available and inexpensive. However, from a topical perspective the first flight covers would make an interesting exhibit. Coverage can be limited to an airline and its 747 flights or a comprehensive survey of all the airlines that have flown the 747. It is not a difficult or complicated area to collect and the subject is interesting.
