It was carried by the Erie Railroad line that connected Buffalo with Warsaw. The Received cancel on the back of the cover is March 30, 1899 at **7 pm**. This was typical from an era where the mail was the only means of communication.



PHILATELIC ABBREVIATIONS

Collectors today have become obsessively reliant upon colorful philatelic illustrations, whereas us older collectors relied on a series of abbreviations that have been around since stamp collecting began.

Most auction catalogs today have full color illustrations and detailed descriptions that go on and on. Old Catalogs produced before the advent of technology relied on brief descriptions as auction houses needed the space for many lots.

It is important to know these abbreviations, especially when you are filling out an auction sheet for a Buffalo Stamp Club auction!



It is helpful to learn these abbreviations when describing stamps.

<u>TOKELAU</u>

Tokelau is comprised of 3 atolls located northeasterly of New Zealand and directly north of the Samoan Islands which can usually be accessed by boat from there in about 24 hours.

Originally Tokelau Islands, the islands are officially a dependent territory of New Zealand and has a population of 1,500. It retains commonwealth status with the UK, and Queen Elizabeth is represented by an Administrator who is the leader. Tokelau has the smallest economy in the world, yet is a leader in renewable energy, being the first 100% solar powered nation in the world!



The first stamps were issued in 1948 and pictures the islands and its scenery.



Tokelau does not have an organized postal system. Mail is processed by New Zealand Post. However, there is a post office on each of the islands that collect and cancel mail.

Fun Fact – One of the atolls, Fakaofo, has swimming pigs that famously catch fish near its coral reef.
