INTERESTING POSTAL HISTORY



The above cover was purchased on eBay for \$4 as an addition to a collection of Buffalo airfield covers. The cover is a 6 cent airmail postal stationery envelope, Scott UC5. On the computer screen, I misread the cachet and thought it was a first flight cover. Imagine my surprise when the cover arrived. I discovered it was not a first flight cover, but rather a commemorative flight cover marking airplane flights over the City of Buffalo during the APS Convention held in Buffalo in August of 1940.

Scenic airplane rides were offered to Convention guests. A scenic bus ride to Buffalo Airport and the airplane ride cost a mere \$1.50!

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 14th * AIRPLANE TRIP OVER BUFFALO * \$1.50 Per Person

The trips were scheduled on Wednesday, August 14. The cachet on the cover reads "Commemorating the Airplane Flight over the City of Buffalo in connection with the Amer. Phil. Society convention. Flights took place at time indicated by R.M.S. postmark".

The trips were scheduled on Wednesday, August 14. The cachet on the cover reads "Commemorating the Airplane Flight over the City of Buffalo in connection with the Amer. Phil. Society convention. Flights took place at time indicated by R.M.S. postmark."

The time on the airmail field postmark is 12 noon. The cover was then taken back to the APS Convention which was being held at the Statler Hotel in Niagara Square, downtown Buffalo. A 3 cent stamp, Scott 895, the Pan-American Union 50th Anniversary stamp, was placed on the upper right corner and cancelled with an 8 PM APS Convention Station postmark. It is addressed in pencil to "W. Feeney, Buffalo Airport." William Feeney was the superintendent of the Buffalo Airport.



The above photo was published in the October 1940 American Philatelist which gave detailed coverage of the Convention. Among the stories was one about the sightseeing flights over the City which was popular among the visitors to the Convention.



BLIZZARD OF 1977

BUFFALO, New York Blizzard of '77



2022 is the 45th anniversary of the Blizzard of 1977. From January 28 to February 1, Western New York was ravaged by high winds which swept snow from frozen Lake Erie over Buffalo and surrounding areas. The area was paralyzed and it would take weeks to dig out. Buffalo would earn its reputation as snow capital of the world!



One year later, the Buffalo Stamp Club would commemorate the Blizzard with a show cover at the Hamilton-Buffalo Reunion stamp show which was held in Buffalo on February 3 - 4, 1978.

Is there a rule somewhere that says the less stamps are used to carry mail, the more the world's nations (and near-nations) will grind out new issues? It sure seems that way.


Just for one example, take Djibouti, a poor country of nearly a million souls that is strategically located at the mouth of the Suez Canal on the horn of East Africa. The monthly version of Linn's Stamp News that catalogs new issues used up nine whole pages and parts of two others to report Djibouti's new issues from February 2020 to May 2021.

To name just a few, Djibouti stamps honored Napoleon, Beethoven, Neil Armstrong, fire trucks, owls, Prince Charles and Lady Diana's wedding, lighthouses, Iwo Jima, the Penny Black and Mao Zedong. All in high denominations, of course.

It turns out that Djibouti's stamp business is managed by a philatelic marketing company called Stamperija in Lithuania. The company also prints stamps (or are they just stickers?) for many other countries, especially ones in Africa. A lot of them never see their "home" country. (The forerunners were the "Sand Dune Countries-Ed.)

It's easy enough for collectors to just ignore the outpouring and go about our interest in older stamps. Who cares about the new stuff? But wait! Because of the flood of new issues, Scott's now takes 12 volumes to catalog stamps of the world at huge costs to collectors and dealers who want up-to-date pricing. And it makes our great hobby something of a joke to outsiders who know a hustle when they see one.
