POLISH EXILE GOVERNMENT

World War II officially started on September 1, 1939 when Germany invaded Poland. The fate of Poland was sealed when Russia attacked on September 17.

Despite their homeland being crushed between two totalitarian giants, Polish soldiers, sailors and airmen fought on —in the Home Army in occupied Poland; in the battles of France and Britain; in the Battle of the Atlantic at sea; with the Allied forces in North Africa; on the Eastern Front with the Soviets; and in Italy, the Netherlands and France.

As the Nazis and Soviets completed their occupation of Poland, the Polish government-in-exile with Wladyslaw Raczkiewicz as its president was first established in Paris, then Angers. The fall of France forced the government to move to London.

To help establish legitimacy, the exile government started issuing postage stamps to be used on packages sent to and from military and merchant vessels. Of the several stamp issues for Polish Nationals living outside Poland's borders during or after World War II the most important and known were printed and issued in England.


On December 15, 1941, the Polish Exile Government in Britain inaugurated the "Polish Postal Service" in a limited way.

POLISH EXILE GOVERNMENT (con't)

The creation of Polish postage stamps and the mail service was dictated by the necessity of maintaining contacts with Poles still fighting, Polish nationals in the world, and to propagandize the fact that Poland still existed and the Polish Army, Air Force, Navy, and Merchant Marine were still fighting beyond Poland's boundaries.

In 1941, the Polish Government-in-Exile began issuing postage stamps for use on letters and packages. These stamps are listed in the Scott Catalogue with catalog numbers prefixed 3K. In total, 20 postage stamps and one semi postal stamp were issued. The designs show Polish military forces in action during the war, and they are popular with militaria and WWII topical collectors.

Not far from the Italian city of Cassino, the Abbey of Monte Cassino was about ¾ of a mile away. In 1944, following the Allied landings in nearby Anzio, the Abbey had a commanding view of the surrounding territory. The Allied forces were certain that the Abbey was being used as an observation point by the German forces. They were wrong, but a bombing campaign leveled the structure. In one of the ironies of war, after the bombing, the Germans did indeed place troops in the ruins. Among the many troops taking part in the battle of Monte Cassino were Polish units commanded by Lt. General Władislaw Anders. Playing a major role in the battle, Polish troops of the 12th Podolian Cavalry Regiment were the first Allied troops to make it to the top of the ruined Abbey. The Germans surrendered to the Polish.

Attending the Great American Stamp Show Sacramento 2022

The Great American Stamp Show (GASS) was held in Sacramento, Ca. from August 25th to the 28th, 2022. Gail and I had the opportunity to attend and enjoy a wonderful APS show.

It was held at the Safe Credit Union Convention Center and the show was billed as the largest philatelic exhibition in the United States for 2022. It was presented jointly by the American Philatelic Society, the American Topical Association, and the American First Day Cover Society. Each of these societies had large welcome tables with free handouts and information for interested parties.

The show was very organized with separate entrance areas for preregistered and walk in attendees. APS members were noted on their name tags. I also wore my Buffalo Stamp club badge, which attracted a lot of attention on its own.

There were rows and rows of exhibits and separate areas for youth and non-judged exhibits. Two of our favorites were an exhibit on the first stamp albums and one on advertising and commercial covers which included a pane of the Larkin Soap Company from right here in Buffalo.

Of special interest was the first day ceremony for the new USPS "Pony Car" stamps. In the USPS booth area, they had the real car that was represented on each stamp so people could have their picture taken with them. Each day had a special cancel related to the cars and the show. I especially liked the Model A postal delivery truck, brought in by a local stamp and car collector.
