QUEEN ELIZABETH II



As we all know Queen Elizabeth passed away on September 8, 2022, ending a reign lasting 70 years. The Queen, among her many philanthropic activities, was a stamp collector! She inherited the stamp collection began by Prince Alfred who in turn sold it to his brother, King Edward VI, who gave it to his son King George V who was a serious stamp collector and added many items to the collection. Queen Elizabeth's father George VI also added to the collection.



The Royal collection is housed in colored binders: red for George V, blue for George VI and green for Elizabeth II. The Royal collection is the most comprehensive stamp collection in the world. It's value is over

100 million dollars. The only major item preventing the collection from being complete is the British Guiana penny magenta.

British and commonwealth philately is conveniently divided into periods of the ruling monarchs, beginning with Queen Victoria. The period of British philately from 1952 through 2022 was the QEII era. As we all know Britain does not print its country name on stamps. An image of the monarch and *ER* indicating *Elizabeth Regina* was printed on all stamps. Upon the death of QEII Prince Charles became King Charles III.



The new era of King Charles III will be called KCIII. His image and symbols of his reign will appear on British and Commonwealth stamps.

The end of the QEII era also means the end of the longest running series of British definitives, the Machin series. While new stamps may not appear, the study of its endless varieties continues!

There have been a number of collections that have been donated to the Club and are in the monthly auctions. They are exceptional value and provide income to the Club. Take advantage!


DUES

ASK AN EXPERT

In the October newsletter was a request for stamp questions or topics. The October submission concerned the following stamps.



The question submitted is: Are these cinderella stamps? Why aren't there any denominations?


The short answer is yes, they are cinderella stamps as they were not officially issued by the French post office and not valid for mail. This answers the question as to why no denominations are present.

These stamps were released to commemorate the Paris Universal Exposition of 1900 which coincided with the Summer Olympics. There were probably lots of different issues. Perhaps they are listed in the French Yvert-Teller catalogue or some other specialist catalogue for cinderella stamps. Maybe they are listed on eBay!

If any French specialists, or any Club member, in the Club wish to comment or add more detailed information, please let Al Carroccia or Alan Davis know. We will report on this topic and other submissions.

WHAT'S WRONG HERE? By Casey Kielbasa



It's amazing what gets through the USPS these days! This cover, postmarked August 1, 2022, caught my eye as the stamp is not a forever stamp we are used to seeing. The stamp is from the US Barns set issued in January 2021 to pay the postcard rate which was 36 cents at the time. This stamp, picturing the Forebay Barn, is Scott 5552. The value of the stamp has since been raised to its current 44 cent value.

The stamp clearly is inscribed "POSTCARD". Because it is tagged, the stamp triggered the machine cancelling machine and sent it on through as regular mail which costs 60 cents!

Did the sender realize the stamp paid the postcard rate or did the sender think it was a regular forever stamp?

We will probably never know, but It makes for an interesting addition to "postal history in the making"!
