DECEMBER NOTES

CIA INVERT

If you went to Cleveland, you had a chance to see the Jenny invert (Scott C3a). If you were at the Autumn Stamp Festival you had a chance to see the "other" famous invert, the CIA invert (Scott 1610c)



Dealer Scott Shaulis has the stamp in stock and is selling it on consignment. The Scott catalog value is \$17,000. The consignment price is \$15,500 but Scott is selling it for \$10,000! It also has a PSE certificate. The reason for the price reduction is that more examples have been discovered.

The story behind the discovery of the CIA invert is just as exciting as that of the Jenny invert. The \$1 stamp from the Americana series was issued on July 2, 1979. The initial discovery of 95 stamps was in 1986 when CIA employees purchased the stamps. They returned to purchase normal examples to swap after they discovered the error.

CIA INVERT (Continued)

The employees contacted dealer Jacques Schiff who immediately purchased some of the inverts. The CIA discovered what had happened and proceeded with disciplinary action against the employees.

In 2023, an intact plate strip of 20 was discovered which came from a second pane raising the census to 115 stamps. There is the possibility that additional stamps may be out there as it is speculated that two error panes of 100 stamps may have escaped destruction after discovery of the errors. Perhaps someone is holding the stamps for sale at the right time. There is also the possibility some stamps were sold and used on mail.

No matter what the story may be, the Buffalo Stamp Club had a famous stamp in its presence. SPEAKING OF KIDS


As Al C. pointed out in the prologue, at the last meeting I pontificated on the need to do a better job of attracting young stamp collectors. Here are a few ideas I proposed:

The Club previously held Christmas parties complete with a dinner, guest speaker, auction and a visit from Santa bearing philatelic gifts!



Club auctions are always exciting as one never knows what will be offered. Bargains are the norm and unique items conjure up spirited bidding.



FLAG STAMPS

A popular area of topical stamps are flag stamps. Many countries have depicted national and local flags on stamps. The American Topical Association (ATA) publishes four checklists in the flag category. One checklist covers US flags only, 1608 stamps! The rest of the world, not including US, UN and NATO and sports flags, covers over 9,000 stamps!



A popular flag collecting area is the United Nations flag series. Since 1980, the U.N. Postal Administration (UNPA) has honored each member country with a stamp depicting that nation's flag. The UNPA issued 16 flag stamps a year until 1989. The series was halted temporarily when all members had been commemorated on a stamp. The UNPA resumed the series in 1997. The complete issue to date now includes 184 issues.


Most, if not all the stamps, are affordable allowing a beginner collector to obtain all the issues. The stamps are issued in different formats which can lead to specialization. Of course, there is the postal history, but that story is for later!
