

Attending the ASDA Dealers at Florex was a pleasure and a wonderful way to spend some free time. The show was held at the Volusia County Fairgrounds in DeLand, Fla., Dec 1 -2, 2023.



The show featured about 16 dealers, mostly from Florida but Dutch Country Auctions (Delaware), Gary Posner (New York) and Roy's Stamp (Ontario, Canada) were some out of state participants. The dealers had a very nice mix of postal history, postcards, topicals and stamps.

I was pleasantly surprised when my name was called, and I was given a \$5 door prize to use for any purchase. It was not wasted.

(Thanks Joe, for the story! Joe travels for his job and hits stamp shows, stamp stores and philatelic attractions, when he is not busy)



Gladstone's 2nd Home Rule Bill 1893 **By: Tim Carey**

The Government of Ireland Bill 1893 (known generally as the Second Home Rule Bill) was the second attempt made by Liberal Party leader William Ewart Gladstone, as Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, to enact a system of home rule for Ireland. Unlike the first attempt, which was defeated in the House of Commons, the second Bill was passed by the Commons, but vetoed by the House of Lords.



Gladstone, a Christian, felt that the Irish question should be viewed through that lens. The Irish had the right to self-governance. The Irish began to come to the realization that only through arms was their freedom to be gained, the same way they lost it.



Erin Go Bragh Essay (certified): 1 penny green on green paper. Very little is known about this essay. It is thought that it may have been produced at the same time as the 1893 Fenian metal plate printings.

(Erin Go Bragh means "Ireland Forever")

Colonial Design Essays (certified): ½ d green, 2 ½ d blue and 4 d brown. They are bogus labels, produced from plates used to illustrate the British Colonial key type stamps in European stamp catalogues of the late 19th century. Still, they reside in famous collections of Irish material.

NEW YEARS TOPICAL COLLECTING





New Years stamps would be an interesting topical collecting area. Most countries issue a stamp commemorating the New Year. A subtopic can be Chinese New Years stamps. 2024 is the year of the dragon.

On the right above is the stamp that the USPS will issue for 2024. The USPS has annually released a stamp for the Chinese New Year.

TELEGRAM COVERS

Before the invention of telephones and way... way before cell phones and email, the quickest way to communicate short, urgent messages was to send a telegram. Telegrams were sent between places that were connected by telegraph lines. A person would visit a telegraph office and write out a message and pay a rate which was based on the number of words in the message.


Most telegrams were very short and to the point. The office would communicate the message via telegraph to the office closest to the recipient. The message was printed on strips and pasted to the telegram. It was delivered to the recipient by mail.

Later, messengers were hired to deliver telegrams, especially in the cities. Telegrams continued even into the 1970's as it was cheaper than making a long-distance phone call!

Telegrams evolved into fax machines and, of course, emails and texting. You can still send a telegram today using the internet!



The above cover enclosed a telegram from the Postal Telegraph System. The telegram was sent by general delivery after arriving in Buffalo on May 13, 1905.




The above Western Union telegram was sent from Moses Lake, Washington on December 2, 1943. Note the message was pasted onto the telegram after being received. Also note the December 4, 1943 postmark.
