UPU COLORS AND THE 1898 FIRST BUREAUS

Have you wondered why so many early US stamps were primarily red, green or blue? In the late nineteenth century, after the introduction of postage stamps, nations took it upon themselves to print stamps of different denominations and colors. It became confusing as postal clerks had difficulty determining whether stamps were valid and paying the correct rates.

In 1896, the Universal Postal Union (UPU) member nations proposed uniform colors for international mail. The colors agreed to were red for standard printed matter, green for postcards, and blue for letters. Most nations complied but it took the US several years to reissue existing stamps. The first group of Bureau issues of 1894 were reissued in 1898 to conform to the new UPU rules.




The one cent Franklin was changed from blue to green. The five cent Grant was changed from chocolate to blue. Other stamps were changed to avoid confusion. The ten cent Webster was changed from green to brown and orange brown and the fifteen cent Clay was changed from blue to olive green.

The first bureau issue presents a wonderful challenge in collecting the different shades, particularly those of the 1898 issues. Of course, there is the postal history not only with the shades, but with the rates.

BACK OF THE BOOK

An aerogram, or air letter sheet, is a foldable sheet with postage imprinted on the sheet. The UPU has specific regulations, such as no enclosures are allowed. Simply, it is letter and postage in one.

The first air letter sheets were issued by Iraq in 1933. The US issued its first air letter sheet in 1947. In 1953 the UPU approved the term aerogramme as the designation for a letter sheet.



The first US aerogram (Scott UC16), issued on April 29, 1947, was imprinted "Air Letter". UC16c was issued in November 1953 and is imprinted "Air Letter" and "Aerogramme".

This first series has many varieties designated as Scott UC16a through UC16d. Yet don't forget about the postal history! There is so much more to collect, and they all tell a story.
